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# Statement of Board Responsibilities

Kerry Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

Section 51 of that Act requires the ETB to keep in such form and in respect of such accounting periods as may be approved by the Minister for Education and Skills with the consent of the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform, all proper and usual accounts of the monies received or expended by it.

In preparing those accounts, the Board is required to:

- (a) apply the standard accounting policies for the preparation of ETB financial statements
- (b) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- (c) disclose and explain any material departures from the standard accounting policies.

The Board is responsible for keeping proper books of account which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Board and which enable it to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with section 51 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

The Board is also responsible for safeguarding its assets and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### Statement on The System of Internal Control

Kerry Education and Training Board (Kerry ETB) was established on 1st July 2013 under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013. On that date, Kerry ETB took over the assets, Sabilities and functions of the former Kerry Education Service (The Vocational Education Committee in Kerry).

The Code of Practice for the Governance for ETBs is set out in Circular Letter 02/2019, which was issued by the Department of Education and Skills to all ETBs in January 2019. The Code of Practice for the Governance of ETBs Circular Letter 02/2019 was adopted by Kerry ETB Board at its meeting on 26th March 2019. Prior to the adoption of The Code of Governance 02/2019, Kerry ETB operated under the Code of Governance Circular Letter 08/2015.

The Audit and Risk Committee met four times in 2019. The Finance Committeee met two times in 2019. The term of the Kerry ETB Board ceased on 26th July 2019 with the formation of a new Board. Accordingly the term of the Finance Committee ceased on this date. Subsequent correspondence was received stating that the term of the Finance Committee was extended until 1st November 2019 in order to address urgent matters. No such urgent matters arose and accordingly only two meetings were held. The Finance Committee will meet at least 4 times in 2020.

#### Responsibility for the System of Internal Control

As Chairperson of Kerry ETB, I acknowledge the responsibility of the Board for ensuring that an efficient and effective system of internal control is maintained and operated. The system can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance that assets are safeguarded, transactions are authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or would be detected in a timely period.

A new board was constituted for Kerry ETB on 10th September 2019 and at its meeting of 22nd October 2019 the board completed the appointment of the new Finance and Audit and Risk Committees.

#### **Key Control Procedures**

The Board has taken steps to ensure an appropriate control environment by:

- · Clearly identifying management and staff responsibilities.
- · Establishing procedures for reporting significant control failures and ensuring appropriate action.
- Establishing procedures for identifying and evaluating all risks which could prevent Kerry ETB from achieving its objectives.

The system of Internal control operated in Kerry ETB is based on:

- Detailed administrative procedures
- · Segregation of duties
- · Specific authorisation
- Internal checks
- Monthly management review of reports outlining the actual and budgeted results of programmes operated by Kerry ETB.

The Board's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by the:

- Recommendations made by the Office of the Comptroller and Auditor General (C&AG) in management letters or other reports.
- Chief Executive, who has responsibility for the financial control framework.
- Work of the Audit & Risk Committee, which considers internal audit reports and reports of the C & AG and reports to the Board whether the Chief Executive is, in the internal auditor's opinion, operating adequate and appropriate systems of control.

An internal audit service is provided by the Internal Audit Unit (IAU) - Education and Training Boards. The following internal audit reviews have been carried out since the 1st January 2019:

(i) Review of Specialist Training Providers

#### Breaches of System of Internal Control

#### 1. Non-compliance with procurement guidelines

Kerry ETB currently does not operate an overall Centralised Purchasing System. The 36 Kerry ETB Schools and Centres, dispersed throughout the county are engaging in procurement at a local School/Centre level. Although these Schools and Centres are seeking quotations as purchases are required, the lack of a centralised purchasing system is a challenge to addressing cumulative spends in a limely manner. Essentially the IT Systems available to the ETB do not provide real time data on purchasing. Purchasing expenditure analysis can only be completed following the actual expenditure. Currently Kerry ETB has the ESI Financial System for all centres except for Kerry College Monavalley Campus (formerly Kerry ETB Tables the SIF Financial System that would provide real time data.

The value of non-compliant cumulative procurement, across all Schools and Centres, in 2019 was c. €351,110. The breakdown of this figure is as follows: Contract Cleaning c.€42,867: Electrical Consumables c.€81,582; Plumbing Consumables c.€47,616; Welding Consumables c.€84,277; External Printing c.€37,270; Legal Services c.€32,078; Cleaning Supplies c.€25,420.

Contract Cleaning: Kerry ETB activated a new Contracted Cleaning Framework in September 2020.

Electrical Consumables; E-Tender completed with a closing date of 03/09/20202. Tender Submissions are currently being evaluated and a Multi-Supplier Framework will be in place by close of 2020.

Plumbing Consumables: An E-Tender was published with a closing date for Tender Submissions of 17th September. There were no tenders submitted. Kerry ETB are currently in the process of re-drafting a number of smaller tenders based on more specific product listings. It is expected that with the revised tenders we will be successful in securing suppliers for these sub lots.

Welding Consumables: Similar to the plumbing consumables this category of expenditure will have to be sub divided into more specific lots and tenders published for these sub lots. Kerry ETB is currently drafting lender documents for these sub lots and it is expected that the tenders will be published by close of 2020 and effective for Q1 of 2021.

External Printing: A Tender competition was published with a closing date of 10th November 2020. The Tender Submissions are being evaluated and it is expected that a successful supplier will be awarded by close of 2020.

Legal Services: We await the launch of the new Legal Services Framework in 2021. Legal Services relating to Employment Law, which forms the substantial part of Kerry ETB's legal fees was procured in 2019.

Cleaning Supplies: This non-compliance related to purchases for cleaning supplies outside of the OGP Framework Supplier

The following remedial action has been taken: Kerry ETB has engaged with the Office of Government Procurement over a period of a number of months in addressing a mini-tender competition for contracted cleaning services for Kerry ETB and this has gone to the market in March 2020. Kerry ETB will proceed, on the basis of cumulative projected spend, to tender for Electrical, Plumbing and Welding Consumables before the end of the first quarter of 2020 and for External Printing in Quarter 2. Kerry ETB is operating employment law legal service under the OGP Framework. Kerry ETB has retained the services of our long standing legal firm in relation to conveyancing and property matters as it was considered prudent to do so given the historical volume of files and transactions and the associated acquired knowledge.

Kerry ETB is proceeding to complete a business case for the establishment of a Centralised Purchasing Unit for Kerry ETB in 2020. The Kerry ETB Board has been advised of same and the process has commenced.

In Quarter 4 of 2020 the stores Department for Kerry College Monavalley campus commenced purchasing for the other three Kerry College Campuses. This is the first step to Centralised purchasing across the Kerry ETB Scheme. We have proposed two pilot Schools for a trial of the Centralised purchasing across Kerry ETB Schools in Quarter 1 of 2021 and once the Pilot phase is completed centralised purchasing will be expanded to all Schools on a phased basis.

#### Statement on The System of Internal Control

In 2019 the following steps were undertaken with a view to increasing overall compliance with Public Procurement: - A Tender process for Bus & Coach Hire was completed in 2019 Accordingly, these services have now been competitively procured. In 2020 the following strategic Tenders (i.e. in excess of €25,000) were completed (please note that this is not an exhaustive list):

- \*Supply of consumable products for Kerry ETB Hair & Beauty Courses
  \*Supply of consumable products for Kerry ETB Plumbing Courses
  \*Supply of consumable products for Kerry ETB Electrical Courses
  \*Contract for the provision of Psychological Courselling Services
  \*Contract for the Provision of Information Technology Support Services to Kerry ETB
  \*Contract for the provision of HR Agency Staff
  \*Compact for the provision of PS Primary School Books

- Kerry ETB procured the Services, via OGP Framework, of a Procurement Consultancy Firm to assist with complex tenders and provide general advice to ensure compliance with
- A monthly expenditure analysis was completed for 2019 and has been used to identify areas of expenditure that have the potential to reach E-Tender levels. These areas are being sed with formal tenders being put in place
- Kerry ETB Procurement Officer has provided formal Procurement training to new staff and existing Line Management. A number of briefings/ presentations have been given to collectively to school and centre office staff. Individual training/briefings have been held for new and promoted staff members. Briefing notes and updates are communicated to the Line managers and posted on the ETB SharePoint information portal for all staff.

- Kerry ETB is currently finalising its Corporate Procurement Plan for the 2020/2021 period. The Corporate Procurement Plan will set out the Procurement objectives for the scheme and the steps that will be implemented to achieve these objectives.

  The Kerry ETB Corporate Procurement Plan for January 2020 to December 2021 was approved by the Kerry ETB Board on 28th April 2020.

  Significant effort has been made in reising awareness around Office of Government Procurement Frameworks and Centralised Contracts. As these Frameworks are activated the Schools/Centres and Programmes are set up on the Framework centrally by the Procurement Officer. An email is issued by the Procurement Officer to all Budget holders and Line Managers with the details of the Framework and a guidance document on how to avail of the service.
- -Guidance Documents are also being issued retrospectively on Frameworks that are underutifised.
  In 2020 the a number of national Frameworks/ Centralised Arrangements were activated and availed of by Kerry ETB. In Quarter 4 of 2020 there are over 40 active Frameworks availed of in In 2020 the a number of national Fram Kerry ETB.

#### 2. Inadequate IT Systems

Entanguate in Systems

Bath the Finance Committee and the Audit & Risk Committee have, on a number of occasions, expressed their concern that the lack of an appropriate, contemporary Financial System presents a significant risks for Kerry ETB. The lack of a sultable Financial System presents a significant organisational challenge and potential control weaknesss. The use of two separate financial reporting systems (with the Kerry College Monavalley Campus - former Training Centre - availing of a separate system to the rest of the organisation) adds further complexity and risk. As outlined above all Centres except for the Kerry College Monavalley Campus are using the ESI System.

As a result of the above, the preparation of the Annual Financial Statements is an extremely manual process which must be completed in line with the annual legislative requirements. The advent of a financial shared service system appears to be the only option in addressing same.

Kerry ETB in 2019 continued to address risk management on an organisational basis, structured around the pillar areas. Kerry ETB has an overall corporate risk register which is kept under review at Senior Management Meetings. Individual risk registers are in place for Further Education & Training and for Schools, Youth & Music. Relevant Directors review same at their Senior Management Meetings. Each School/Centre maintains a local risk register. Risks are elevated between registers as required. The Corporate Risk Register is kept under review by the Director of Organisation Support & Development.

All registers were maintained and updated by the relevant Hoad of Department, Principal/Centre Manager, Senior Management, Director etc. This ensures that ownership of the risks are

managed at the appropriate level. Risk Management is a standing agenda Item at all Management meetings including the ETB Board meetings.

In 2020, in time with the requirements of Circular Letter 0002/2019, Kerry ETB has engaged the Institute of Public Administration (IPA) for a workshop to review the approach to managing risk to ensure full compliance with the Circular Letter 0002/2019 i.e. the development of a risk management framework. A draft Risk Appetite Statement has been developed and will be finalised following completion of the review by the IPA. The IPA workshop was scheduled for Friday 13th March, 2020 but has been postponed due to the Coronavirus.

4. Single Public Service Pension Scheme

Due to IT system and resource limitations Kerry ETB have not been in a position to comply with the legistative requirements of the Single Pension Scheme to provide staff members with annual and cessation of employment benefit statements. It is envisaged that the introduction of payroll shared services will provide a system to automate this process. Manual calculations of Benefit Statements are provided on request. Kerry ETB have also commenced a process to complete the manual calculation of annual Benefit Statements. As outlined above our current IT Systems are finited and this manual process is extremely labour intensive and time consuming.

# 5. Protected Disclosures

As required under Section 22 of the Protected Disclosures Act 2014 Kerry ETB can confirm that no protected disclosures were received to the end of 2019. Consequently no action was required to be taken by Kerry ETB in relation to Protected Disclosures.

Kerry ETB has measures in place to counter fraud and an Anti-Fraud and Corruption Policy and Procedure was adopted by the Board on 1st October, 2019. At the time of writing there are no tified incidents of fraud to disclose.

An Internal Audit function is provided by the Internal Audit Unit - Education and Training Boards."

"The audit findings are based on the IAU-ETBs terms of reference and the internal audit unit provides an overall audit opinion on the area audited"

The overall opinion is based on the findings identified during the audit and the range of possible opinions are as follows

- · Comprehensive system of internal control is adequate and operates effectively
- Adequate system of internal control is generally adequate and operates effectively
- · Inadequate system of internal control is inadequate and does not operate effectively

In 2019 an Audit of Specialist Training Providers was undertaken by ETB Internal Audit Unit. The Internal Audit deemed the overall System of Internal Control for the Specialist Training Provision to be inadequate and this has been notified to the Department of Education & Skills and SOLAS as required. The Kerry ETB Board and the Audit & Risk Committee have been advised of same. Kerry ETB has engaged with the Specialist Training Provider to address the findings of the report.

The Internal Audit Report contained 14 recommendations (7 High risk, 6 Medium risk and 1 Low risk). In October 2020 a "Review of Previous Audit Findings" was completed by the Internal Audit Unit. This review found that of the 14 findings in the initial Internal Audit is of the findings have been implemented (4 High risk, 3 Medium risk and 1 Low risk) and 5 of the recommendations have been partially implemented (2 High risk and 3 Medium risk). One finding (#§rh risk) remains not implemented. This finding relates to the non-procured nature of the STP. In January 2020 the Internal Audit Unit issued a sectoral report in January 2020. One of the thematic findings related to the Procurement of STPs and the recommendations stated that input from SOLAS and the DES may be deemed appropriate and beneficial to assist in resolving same. This is a longstanding issue and as noted in the addendum to the original Internal Audit Report Kerry ETB did take steps to seek to resolve same previously. This is a national issue and Kerry ETB does not have the ability to resolve without a change in National

#### Finance Committee Review

The Finance Committee reviewed the Financial Statements of Kerry ETB on the 30th March 2020 and recommended their adoption by the Board and submission of these to the Comptroller and Auditor General for audit.

#### Statement on The System of Internal Control

#### **Annual Review of Controls**

Kerry ETB is committed to operating an efficient, effective and economic internal control system. I confirm that the Audit Committee at its meeting on 10<sup>th</sup> March 2020, conducted a review of the effectiveness of the system of internal financial control for year ended 31st December 2019 in the manner prescribed by the Code of Practice for the Governance of Education & Training Boards.

#### This included:

A review of internal and external audit reports issued in 2019 and to date in 2020 along with an examination of minutes of meetings of the Board, Audit Committee and Finance Committee.

The Audit Committee also got confirmation from the Chief Executive that on balance the system of internal control is adequate and appropriate. The Chief Executive based this statement on information gathered from senior managers across the organisation.

The Audit Committee presented a report on the review of controls to the Board on 31st March 2020.

A Risk Register is kept up-to-date and presented to the Audit Committee on a regular basis. The Board reviewed and approved this statement at its meeting held on 31st March 2020.

As part of the review of the System of Internal Controls the Audit & Risk Committee expressed concerns that the lack of an appropriate modern integrated financial management system presents significant risks for Kerry ETB's control environment and effective cost and financial accounting and management. The remediation of this has been highlighted by the Audit & Risk Committee as an important priority.

#### In my opinion,

#### **Responsibilities of Board Members**

As detailed in the statement of Board responsibilities, the Board members are responsible for

- the keeping of proper books of account which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Board
- safeguarding the Board's assets and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# Responsibilities of the Comptroller and Auditor General

I am required under the Education and Training Boards Act 2013 to audit the financial statements of Kerry Education and Training Board and to report thereon to the Houses of the Oireachtas.

My objective in carrying out the audit is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement due to fraud or error. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the ISAs, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. In doing so,

- I identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of
  the financial statements whether due to fraud or error;
  design and perform audit procedures responsive to those
  risks; and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and
  appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of
  not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud
  is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may
  involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions,
  misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- I obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal controls.

- I evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures

#### Information other than the financial statements

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information presented with those statements, and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, I am required under the ISAs to read the other information presented and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or with knowledge obtained during the audit, or if it otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact.

#### Reporting on other matters

My audit is conducted by reference to the special considerations which attach to State bodies in relation to their management and operation. I report if I identify material matters relating to the manner in which public business has been conducted.

I seek to obtain evidence about the regularity of financial transactions in the course of audit. I report if I identify any material instance where public money has not been applied for the purposes intended or where transactions did not conform to the authorities governing them.

I also report by exception if, in my opinion,

- I have not received all the information and explanations I required for my audit, or
- the accounting records were not sufficient to permit the financial statements to be readily and properly audited, or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records.

#### 2 Other Services

The Board also acts as an Agent and runs Self-Financing Projects.

Agency work involves running a programme on behalf of another organisation or students, according to agreed criteria and the Board is reimbursed its cost.

Self-Financing Projects are programmes run under the complete control of the Board either for the Board or other organisations.

The ETB does not make pension contributions in respect of employees. Since 2013 all new entrants are obliged to join the Single Public Pension Scheme.

From 1 January 2019 onwards, members of public service defined pension scheme pay an additional superannuation contribution (ASC) ARISING FROM THE public service stability agreement (2018- 2020) and the public service pay and pension act 2017. ASC replaced the pension related deduction (PRD) WHICH ceased in 2018. While PRD was a temporary emergency measure, ASC is a permanent contribution in respect of pensionable remuneration. The amount collected in 2019 was €1,159,482 which was remitted to the Department of Education and Skills.

# Financial Statements - Year Ended 31 December 2019

# Establishment of the Education and Training Board and the Accounting Policies

#### 1 Establishment of the Education and Training Board

Kerry Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 and its functions are set out in section 10 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

Community National Schools came under the Patronage of the ETB with the commencement of the 2017/2018 academic year.

# 2 Significant Accounting Policies

# (a) Basis of Presentation

The financial statements are presented in the form approved by the Minister for Education and Skills with the consent of the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform. They consist of a Statement of Accounting Policies, an Operating Statement, a Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities and notes to the financial statements.

Where necessary, the comparative figures for the previous year have been restated on the same basis as those for the current year.

#### (b) Basis of Preparation

The Operating Statement presents Receipts and Payments by Programme Grouping and the resultant Cash Surplus / (Deficit) is adjusted for other debtor and creditor movements to determine the overall result for the period on an accruals basis.

The Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities is prepared on the accruals basis by determining state grant and other funder balances at amounts that reflect the related expenditure incurred in accordance with the funding rules.

Third Party Debtors are included in Current Assets. Pay and Expense Liabilities are included in Current Liabilities.

# (c) Tangible Fixed Assets

All assets purchased including land and buildings, fixtures and fittings and training equipment are expensed in the year of purchase. State grants to fund the purchase of tangible fixed assets are recognised in the same year.

#### (d) Stocks

All consumable stocks are expensed as purchased.

# (e) Superannuation

The pension entitlements of ETB staff, including those who transferred from SOLAS, are conferred under defined benefit schemes. Staff employed since 2013 are included in the Single Public Service Pension Scheme and monthly payments are made to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

Superannuation deductions made from employees' pay in respect of the schemes are retained by the ETB as part of agreed Exchequer funding, or paid over to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

The ETB does not make any contributions towards the schemes.

These unfunded schemes are operated on a pay as you go basis with the annual pension entitlements being paid by the National Shared Services Office on behalf of the ETB. ETB's are responsible for the administration of their pensions. Pension funds are provided by the Department of Education and Skills.

Provision has not been made in the financial statements for the present cost of the future benefits that have accrued to staff members and existing pensioners under these schemes.

# (f) Lease Rentals

All lease rentals are expensed as incurred.

# Notes to The Financial Statements - Year Ended 31st December 2019

#### 35 Charity Note

Kerry ETB has chartiable status under the Charities Act 2009 and is registered with the Charities Regulator. The Charity Number is CHY 20885.

#### 36 Connected Persons

There were no transactions with connected persons during the year.

#### 37 Events after the year end

Since the end of the reporting period, the economy and the ETB sector have been significantly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. However, Kerry ETB continues to carry out it's vital role in education and training while being focused on ensuring continuity of education for learners, including a particular focus on more vulnerable students.

The effects of the pandemic will have financial implications for Kerry ETB in 2020 and beyond. The financial impacts of COVID-19 commenced in March 2020 and given the unprecedented uncertainty of the situation that Kerry ETB finds itself in, a reliable estimate of the costs and savings arising from COVID-19 cannot not be made at this time. However, the main factors giving rise to additional costs and reduction in income are as follows:

- · Additional unplanned expenditure on ICT equipment and software support to enable the continuation of learning for students and the safety of its employees by remote working.
- · Additional costs to deliver training as it is expected that extra training allowances to participants in further education and training programmes will continue until courses are completed which may lead to some additional costs over the summer months.
- . Anticipated reductions in income. Kerry ETB anticipates a reduction in self-generated income as some programmes are on hold and the Outdoor Education Centres has temporarily closed. PLC fee income is also likely to be reduced as more participants become eligible for free fees.

It is anticipated that the additional costs will be partially offset by savings in the areas of:

- · substitution costs.
- · consumables and costs incurred for contract management services and
- · savings associated with the delivery of apprenticeships as most craft apprentices are released to their employers and there are no further intakes currently (it should be noted that this delay is likely however to lead to greater costs from 2021).

Kerry ETB has taken the following steps to manage the effects of the pandemic:

From the commencement of this crisis Kerry ETB engaged its business continuity plan to ensure that its operations continued as normal in line with it's regulatory requirements.

- · The Audit and Risk Committee has reviewed the updated Kerry ETB risk register to take account of the specific risks arising and Kerry ETB will develop and ensure implementation of additional control measures as required.
- The Department of Education and Skills has put in place a range of steering and engagement structures to support the education and training system in navigating the challenges of COVID-19. Kerry ETB is participating in these structures to ensure a joined-up approach across the education sector.

In the medium to long term, the ETB sector will have a significant role to play in the overall tertiary system response needed for labour market activation which will form part of a broader cross government and cross agency response. As a result, there will be a particular focus on effective management of resources and capacity.
